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Community-based social innovations for healthy ageing: evidence from middle income countries

Community based social innovations (CBSIs) are initiatives that seek to empower older people to improve their ability and confidence in caring for themselves and others, maintain well-being and promote social cohesion and inclusiveness. They are of particular interest in low- and middle-income countries as they strive to meet the needs of their increasingly ageing populations.

The presentation will draw on a systematic review of effectiveness and cost-effectiveness, case studies (n = 10) and our typology development to understand: What are CBSIs? How do they operate? What is their impact on healthy ageing? and, What can we learn from different types of CBSIs? Answers to these will be suggested and consideration will be given to implications for research and policy.
